- Walking with Kids
 - o Forested trails Big Rock, Evans Creek, Beaver Lake

- Formal Native Plant gardens Big Rock Central next to Tree House, Lower Commons near the pea patch, across from Klahanie Park near the powerline

- New parks are planned for Big Rock South, Beaton Hill, and "notch" to Lower Commons (formerly chicken farm area)

Eastside Features

- Major roosting spots for 1,000s of crows and ravens at dusk (Bothell UW campus)
- Riversides
- Forest paths
- Lakefront beaches
- Restored nature gardens
- Historical railroad depots (Duval, Issaquah, North Bend, Renton, and 2 in Snoqualmie)
- Museums, many in historical homes
- Miner's Cemetery in Newcastle
- "Great selfie spot" at Redmond Downtown Park, vicinity of the orange and red tables and chairs
